In ordinary discourse, arguments often function as a way to convince a specific audience. In argumentation theory, this approach to argument has been highlighted in pragma-dialectics, a theory which originates in Van Eemeren and Grootendorst

A typical example is the argument from expert opinion, which has two premises: Socrates was mortal is an example of argument by analogy because the reasoning employed in it proceeds from a particular truth in a premise to a similar particular truth in the conclusion, namely that Socrates was mortal.
